Dirk van Hasseltsteeg, former location of Rieuwertsz's bookshop. Spinoza was a proofreader here.

Keizersgracht 65, the house of Pieter Corneliszoon Hooft.

Keizersgracht 123, the house of Comenius.

Westermarck 6, Descartes lived here in 1634. John Locke lived in one of the buildings adjacent to the church in 1683/84.

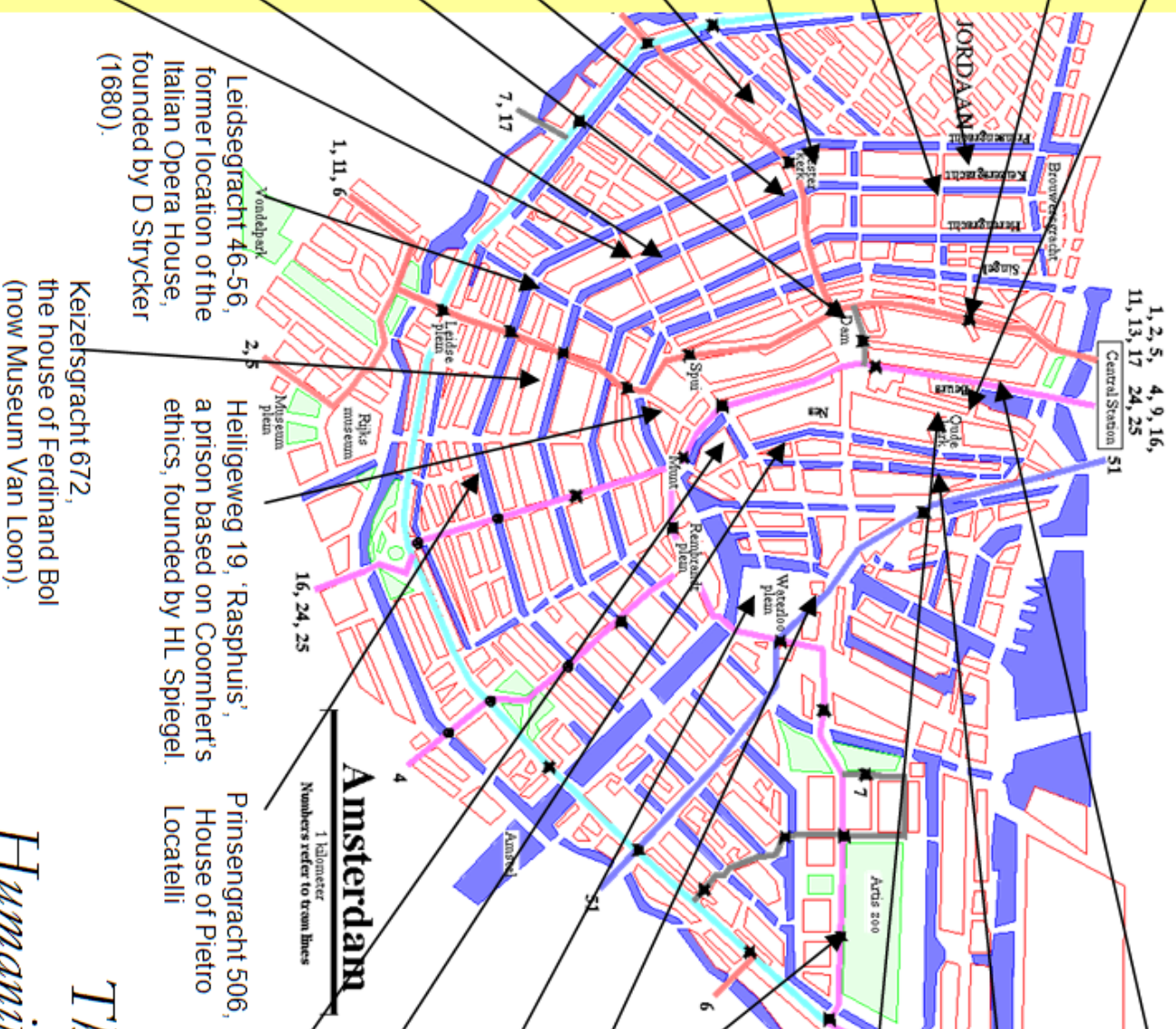
Bloemstraat 15, Bibliotheca Philosophica Hermetica.

Keizersgracht 149, Joachim von Sandrart lived here from 1637 to 1645.

Nieuwe Kerk, graves of Caspar Barlaeus, Pieter Cornelisz Hooft, Pompeius Occo and J.F. Martinet. Commemorative signs for Hugo Grotius and Joost van den Vondel.

Keizersgracht 324, Felix Meritis, a society for the promotion of arts and sciences founded in 1777.

Keizersgracht 384, former location of the City Theatre founded in 1617 by Samuel Coster, housing the 'Duytsche Academie'.



Damrak 45-47, former location of the printing shops of Jacob Aertsz Colon, Willem Blaeu and Johannes Janssonius.

Oudezijds Achterburgwal 215-219, house of GJ Vossius; no. 213, house of C Barlaeus.

Oude Kerk, JP Sweelinck played the organ here. Commemorative signs for Karel van Mander and Maria Roemers Visscher.

Plantage Middenlaan 45, Artis Library.

Jodenbreestraat 4-6, the house of Rembrandt.

Vlooienburg, Spinoza was born in this area.

Oudezijds Voorburgwal 231, Athenaeum Illustre, founded around 1630.

Oude Turfmarkt 129, Bibliotheca Rosenthaliana, including collection Menasseh ben Israel.
